	Riots in UK cities			
Some cities in the UK suffered an outbreak of rioting and looting in the summer of 2011. The police struggled to keep the streets safe for a number of nights. Many police and rioters were hurt in the violence. Shops and businesses were attacked and property stolen. Some of the riots were apparently triggered by the shooting dead of a young black man by the police. This raises the question about how some groups in society are treated.				
Many explanations for the riots were put forward. Amongst the reasons, some people said the riots occurred because those involved were from an <i>underclass</i> which does not abide by society's rules. Others argued that the rioters were powerless people fighting back against an unjust society. There were others who thought the rioters were little more than thieves and vandals, intent on destruction.

Many politicians and members of the public believe that the decision goes against democracy, as Parliament has debated the issue and is against a change in the law. Others argue that this is exactly the reason why we need human rights legislation and the courts to protect minorities from over-powerful politicians and public opinion.
