Answer Question 1 and **either** Question 2 **or** Question 3. Each question has **two** parts. Answer **both** parts of each question chosen.

Question 1

Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

Source A Adapted from an account by the Spanish Ambassador of the coronation of Anne Boleyn

At the coronation of Anne Boleyn no-one shouted 'God save the Queen,' as Anne went past. Many people laughed at the letters H and A painted everywhere along the route of her procession. Her crown did not fit well. The coronation was a cold, thin and very unpleasant thing, to the great regret, anger and reluctance not only of the common people but also of all the rest. It seems that the indignation of everybody

about the break with Rome has increased by half since that event.

Source C

By the time that legislation had culminated in the Act of Supremacy in 1534, all traces of papal primacy had been removed. Henry believed that God's intention was that the Church in every realm should be ruled by its king. The political fall-out was immense. More and Fisher were the most outspoken opponents, but they were

5 by no means the only ones. The Princess Mary had many sympathisers. Charles V was even more alienated than before and allowed the Spanish Ambassador to intrigue vigorously with Henry's opponents.
