#### Question 1

Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

**Source A** Adapted from *L'Ami du Roi,* a Royalist newspaper commenting on the flight to Varennes, June 1791

King Louis has a duty to oppose those who wish to destroy the monarchy and France. Thus, far from being condemned as a crime, Louis' flight should, on the contrary, be acclaimed a great blessing. Instead of receiving from his people expressions of hatred and contempt, he should experience at their hands nothing

- 5 but love and respect. The king has to be truly free; otherwise there can be no constitution, no laws, no order, no tranquility. The king did not go to the frontier to rally foreign princes so that he could return to France and support despotism. That was a lie. His concern was the welfare of his subjects and he had always wanted to be the father and friend of his people.
- **Source B** Adapted from a radical French newspaper reporting the re-entry of the royal family to Paris on 25 June 1791 after the flight to Varennes

The Queen appeared upset, pretending to weep, and the king had got drunk. This was no triumphal procession. It was the prison convoy of the monarchy. The king, the father of the French, had deserted his post and escaped in the hope of sending us several years of foreign and domestic war. This was a cowardly, treacherous

- 5 conspiracy and this vile king has tried to fool you. Citizens! Let him go, never to return. Now that the nation has established its rights it will not be so stupid as to take back a coward like the king.
