Section A

Answer Question 01.

Source A

Adapted from Victor Serge's book 'From Lenin to Stalin', written in 1937. Serge was a colleague of Zinoviev during the civil war and embraced the position of the Left Opposition from 1926.

Lenin was good-natured, unassuming, ordinary in appearance; an outsider would scarcely have noticed him. Trotsky, on the other hand, would nowhere have passed unnoticed, with his shock of hair, the erect carriage of his head, the intensity of his blue-grey eyes. He had about him something authoritative and compelling. On the platform his voice had a metallic ring, and each sentence was like a sharp thrust. He was to become the superior orator of this revolution. His written style was consummately skilful. But the main thing was that the hour which had struck was the hour he had awaited, foreseen, and desired all his life.

Source B

Adapted from Lenin's Last Testament written in 1922.

Comrade Stalin, having become Secretary-General, has unlimited authority concentrated in his hands, and I am not sure whether he will always be capable of using that authority with sufficient caution. Comrade Trotsky, on the other hand is distinguished not only by outstanding ability, but also he is personally perhaps the most capable man in the present Central Committee, but he has displayed excessive self-assurance and shown excessive preoccupation with the purely administrative side of the work. These two qualities of the two outstanding leaders of the present Central Committee might inadvertently lead to a split, and if our Party does not take steps to avert this, the split may come unexpectedly.

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With reference to these sources and your understanding of the historical context, which of these two sources is more valuable in explaining why Trotsky failed to win the power struggle?
