- 1 (a) In the context of statutory interpretation, outline, using cases, any **three** of the following:
- the **literal** rule;
 - the **golden** rule;
 - the **mischief** rule;
 - the **purposive** approach. *(20 marks)*
- (b) Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of any **two** of the rules (approaches) identified in (a) above. *(10 marks)*
- 2 (a) Give an outline description of any **three** influences operating on Parliament before and during the legislative process, and explain the formal process of statute creation. *(20 marks)*
- (b) Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of the legislative process. *(10 marks)*
- 3 (a) Explain, giving examples, what is meant by delegated legislation. *(15 marks)*
- (b) Both Parliament and judges are able to control delegated legislation. Outline how these controls work and discuss the advantages and disadvantages of these methods of control. *(15 marks)*
- 4 (a) Describe the essential features of the doctrine of judicial precedent. *(15 marks)*
- (b) Outline how judges might avoid following precedent and discuss why they might wish to do so. *(15 marks)*
- 5 (a) Describe the functions of the main institutions of the European Union (EU). *(15 marks)*
- (b) Discuss what effect, if any, UK membership of the EU has had on the doctrine of parliamentary supremacy. *(15 marks)*
