THE NHS is winning the war against the MRSA superbug, figures out today will show.

They reveal a near 11 per cent reduction in cases of the infection partly blamed on dirty hospitals.

Yesterday Health Secretary John Reid said it marked a turning-point in the fight against the killer bug.

Amid a furious debate about the NHS, he challenged those condemning it to start "congratulating".

In the six months to September 2004, MRSA cases fell from 3,940 to 3,519.

Mr Reid, stressing infection control would remain a priority, said cleaning was being improved and the "latest science" being brought into play.

A new test to be unveiled today will identify those infected within hours.
