SECTION A

Factors Affecting the Nature and Development of Elite Performance

Answer two from three questions from this section.

Total for this question: 15 marks

The nature of elite sport has altered dramatically since the 19th century.

- (a) (i) What factors have led to an increase in the *status* of professional sports *(3 marks)*
 - (ii) Why did amateurs have a higher social status than professionals in the 19th century? (3 marks)
- (b) Discuss the suggestion that modern-day sponsorship deals have positively **and** negatively influenced the *behaviour* of elite sports performers. (4 marks)
- (c) Why do some national governments provide financial support for their elite performers? (5 marks)

Total for this question: 15 marks

Many elite sports have a high public profile and offer the performers extrinsic rewards.

- (a) Explain what is meant by the term *gamesmanship* and give examples of its use in different sporting situations. (3 marks)
- (b) The law is becoming increasingly involved with sport.

Explain why elite performers may need the protection of the law during their sporting careers. (3 marks)

(c) Spectators may overreact at sporting events.

Discuss how **players**, the **club** and the **community** can work together to help reduce the occurrence of hooliganism. (5 marks)

(d) The "lombardian ethic" is the dominant sporting ethic in the USA.

Using your knowledge of professional sport in the USA, explain how this attitude is displayed. (4 marks)

World games allow elite performers to demonstrate their exceptional skills and abilities.

- (a) Using **Table 1**, outline the changes that have occurred in female participation at the Olympic Games. (2 marks)
- (b) Suggest reasons why opportunities for female elite performers are still **restricted** when compared with male performers. (5 marks)
- (c) Using your knowledge of either France or the USA, explain how their system of sport attempts to ensure that male and female performers progress to elite level. (4 marks)
- (d) Competing at the highest level is expensive.

How are elite *amateur* performers funded in the United Kingdom (UK)? (4 marks)

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SECTION B

Synoptic Assessment

Answer three from four questions from this section.

Total for this question: 12 marks

Since the 19th century, many people have developed a range of skills in order to participate in a variety of sporting and recreational activities.

- (a) What social and cultural factors have caused the participation rates in outdoor and adventurous activities to increase? (6 marks)
- (b) Schmidt's Schema Theory explains how a performer can develop the skills required to participate in a new activity. Explain the principles of this theory. (6 marks)

Figure 1 shows the England rugby team celebrating their success in the 2003 World Cup.



- (a) Discuss the importance of *cohesion* when developing a successful team **and** explain how a coach can improve the cohesiveness of a team. (6 marks)
- (b) Discuss the advantages **and** disadvantages for an individual, team and the sport following success at major championships. (6 marks)

Gymnastic activities require the performer to demonstrate controlled movement patterns in an evaluative situation.

- (a) Explain how gymnasts can control their rotational movements by adjusting their body shape. (6 marks)
- (b) How may a coach develop the *self-efficacy* of a gymnast preparing for a competition? (6 marks)

Total for this question: 12 marks

In order to increase the number of elite performers, many governing bodies are developing talent identification programmes.

- (a) What features need to be included when developing an effective talent identification programme? (5 marks)
- (b) To compete effectively, many performers need to develop their *cardio-respiratory endurance*.

This may be achieved by running for extended periods several times a week. How would a performer calculate their workload intensity **and** what long-term physiological adaptations may occur? (7 marks)
