 - (b) Explain how the religion you have studied might analyse the causes and consequences of consumerism, and assess how convincing this analysis is. (30 marks)
- 2 (a) Explain how the religion you have studied approaches the issue of animal experimentation. (20 marks)
 - (b) (i) Explain virtue ethics as formulated by Aristotle. (10 marks)
