Answer **two** questions.

- 1 (a) Outline **both** the cosmological argument as presented by the Kalam tradition **and** the ontological argument as presented by Anselm. (20 marks)
- (b) “There is *a posteriori* and *a priori* reasoning. There are inductive and deductive arguments.”
- Explain the type of reasoning and argument used in the ontological argument, and assess how far the argument proves the existence of God. (30 marks)
- 2 (a) Explain how natural evil may be seen as a challenge to belief in God and how the Irenaean theodicy deals with this challenge. (20 marks)
- (b) Explain how the Augustinian theodicy deals with the problem of natural evil, and assess how far the Irenaean and Augustinian theodicies succeed in dealing with this problem. (30 marks)
- 3 (a) Examine the main features of near-death experiences. (20 marks)
- (b) Explain the issues that arise in attempting to authenticate near-death experiences, and assess the claim that near-death experiences can never be authenticated. (30 marks)
