Your answers should refer to the sources as appropriate but you should also include other relevant information.

- (a) Briefly explain **two** ways in which schools could develop 'citizenship skills' in their students (**Source A**). (4 marks)
- (b) Briefly examine some of the reasons why young people are often not as involved in the local and wider community as governments may wish them to be. (10 marks)
- (c) Assess the problems that secondary school pupils might face in trying to organise a nation-wide political campaign such as that described in **Source B**. (16 marks)

2 (a) Briefly examine some of the ways in which **one** of the following groups may have restricted life chances:

women;

or ethnic minorities;

or disabled people.

(10 marks)

(b) Assess the effectiveness of anti-discrimination legislation in the UK.

(20 marks)

- 3 (a) Briefly examine some of the ways in which particular social groups may be labelled and stereotyped by the mass media. (10 marks)
 - (b) Assess the reasons why some social groups are more likely than others to experience poverty. (20 marks)
