



Item G

Social mobility and region

A report published in 2011 looked at reasons why social mobility in England varied between regions.

The report found that people who lived in south-west England were 83% more likely to suffer downward social mobility compared with people who lived in London. The figure for people living in north-east England was 73%.



In 2011, the number of young people aged between 16 and 24 who were out of work rose to one million. This meant that the unemployment rate for this group was over twice that for the population as a whole. Some writers fear that the current generation of young people faces a lifetime of long-term unemployment.
