

Why are some people poor?

A survey in 2011 asked people about the various causes of poverty. Of those surveyed, 75% said that drug and alcohol abuse was a major factor, and 25% also said people were poor because they lacked willpower. In addition, 65% of respondents said that people were poor because they did not want to work and preferred living on benefits.

However, about 40% of those surveyed also said poverty was just a normal part of everyday life.

Item H

Pensioners face rising fuel poverty

In a national newspaper report in 2012, a major charity is quoted as saying that half of the elderly people they surveyed are turning down their heating because it is too expensive.

The charity says that two million elderly people are going to bed to keep warm, even though they are not tired, because they cannot afford the rising cost of fuel.
