The minimum marks in these components needed for various grades were previously published with these mark schemes, but are now instead included in the Report on the Examination for this session.

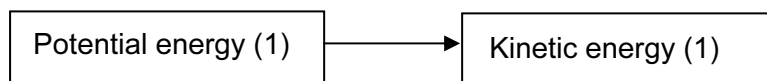

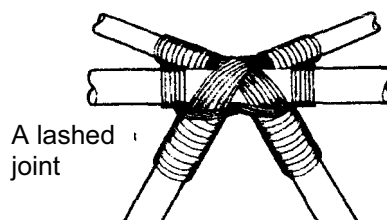
3 Structures can be classified in to two main types

(b) (i) The effect of impact (1) can cause a structure to fail (1). It increases the moment (1) of the applied force. [3]

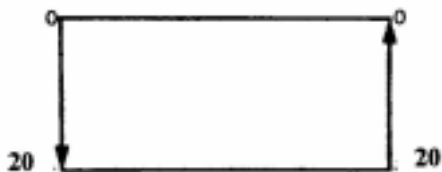
(ii) Benefit: Quick and easy to build up a structure [2]

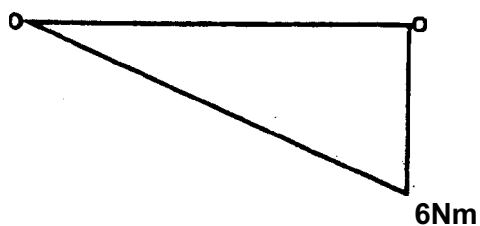

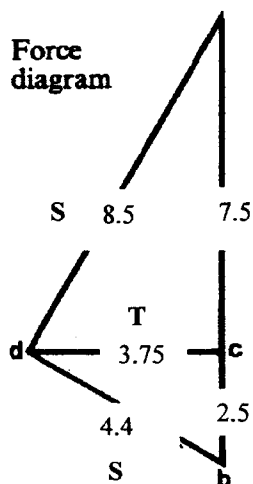

- (d) (i) Moments @ R1
 $10 \times 0.75 = 3 \times R_2$ (1)
 $7.5/3 = R_2$ (1) = 2.5 N (1)
 For equilibrium $R_1 + R_2 = 10$ N
 thus $R_1 = 10$ N – 2.5 N = 7.5 N (1)

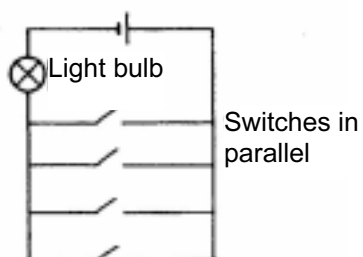

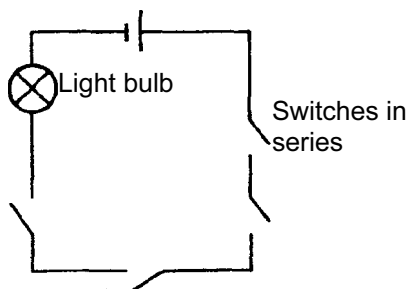

(iii) Toggle switch; slider switch

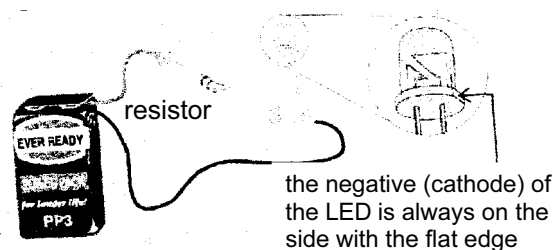

(b) (i) The resistor R_1 and capacitor C_1 act together (1) to create a delay (1) which can be varied according to their values (1). [3]

(ii) The transistor acts as a sensitive switch (1) to control the current flow (1) through the bulb (1). [3]

(iii) Electrolytic capacitors have polarity (1) and must be connected accordingly (1). Ceramic capacitors are usually small value capacitors and can be connected either way round (1) [3]

(ii) The resistor is a current limiting device (1) that will protect the LED (1) from overload (1) [3]

(d) Total Resistance = $V/I = 9/0.001 = 9000 \Omega$ (1)

$R_2 = V_2/I = 2/0.001 = 2000 \Omega$ (1)

Thus $R_1 + R_2 = 9000$ (1) and $R_1 = 9000 - 2000 = 7000$ (1)
