- whether the politics of a country should affect its right to take part in international events.

Discuss this topic with the Examiner.

Please use the following ideas to help develop the conversation:

- how much writing you do in your daily life
- if you were to write a book what it would be about
- the skills and characteristics required to be a professional writer
- ways in which writing can be very powerful
- whether writers should be free to write what they want.

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
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E The police

- · ways that you think you could be happier
- what is meant by 'job satisfaction' and how this can be achieved
- whether there is a connection between wealth and happiness
- the suggestion that the world would be a better place if we were all content with what we have.

You are free to consider any other related ideas of your own.

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H Consideration for others

We all have a duty to be considerate towards other people in our daily lives.

Discuss this topic with the Examiner.

Please use the following ideas to help develop the conversation:

- times when you have been considerate towards others
- how you expect other people to treat you
- basic human rights that we should all be entitled to
- occasions when people are treated unfairly in society
- the suggestion that the individual is more important than society.

The ways in which animals are reared and crops are grown can vary a lot.

Discuss farming methods with the Examiner.

Please use the following ideas to help develop the conversation:

- the types of farming that you see around you or you know about
- whether or not you would enjoy working on a farm
- how farming is changing in the modern world
- the advantages and disadvantages of importing and exporting food
- the fact that the world produces plenty of food yet some people don't have enough to eat.

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
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J Science
