Romulus² rex ipse a turba³ fugientium ad veterem portam Palatii⁴ actus est. ibi, arma ad caelum tollens, Iovem sic oravit: 'avibus tuis iussus, Iuppiter, hic in Palatio⁴ prima fundamenta⁵ urbis posui. Sabini⁶ arcem scelere⁷ captam iam habent; inde huc armati⁸ trans mediam vallem progrediuntur; nunc tu, pater deorum 5 hominumque, hinc, oro, coge hostes discedere; redde virtutem Romanis; noli eos sinere tam ignave⁹ fugere. promitto¹⁰ me, si urbs hodie tuo auxilio servata erit, hic templum tibi aedificaturum esse: sic liberi nostri meminerint te in tanto periculo nos maxime adiuvisse.' his rebus dictis, rex statim visus est credere preces¹¹ suas a deo 10 iam auditas esse. 'hic' inquit, 'Romani, Iuppiter optimus et maximus vos resistere¹² et cum Sabinis⁶ iterum pugnare iubet.' restiterunt¹² Romani, quasi¹³ voce dei iussi. Mettius¹⁴, Sabinorum⁶ princeps, ab arce decucurrerat¹⁵ et fugientes Romanos trans totum forum egerat nec procul¹⁶ iam a porta Palatii⁴ aberat. in eum cum manu¹⁷ iuvenum iam ferocissimorum Romulus² impetum fecit et reppulit¹⁸.

The cleverness of the Athenian leader Themistocles defeats the Persians

cum Xerxes¹, rex Persarum², Athenas peteret, cives legatos Delphos³ miserunt, nam cognoscere volebant quid necesse esset facere de rebus suis. Pythia⁴ legis respondit necesse esse muris ligneis⁵ se munire. cum nemo id responsum intellegeret, Themistocles⁶ cives monuit ut in naves se suasque res ponerent. tali consilio probato⁷, ad classem addiderunt⁸ multas naves, suaque omnia quae moveri poterant deportaverunt⁹. arcem sacerdotibus¹⁰ tradiderunt, reliquum oppidum reliquerunt. sed Xerxes¹, qui Graecos in priore¹¹ pugna iam superaverat, statim Athenas petivit, urbemque, nullis defendentibus, interfectis sacerdotibus¹⁰ quos in arce invenerat, incensam delevit. cum nautae Graecae classis territi manere non auderent et plurimi hortarentur ut a navibus suis discederent seque intra muros defenderent, Themistocles⁶ tamen solus restitit¹². itaque nocte servum fidelem ad regem misit ut ei nuntiaret hostes eius fugere. hac re audita, Xerxes¹, qui verbis servi credidit, postero¹³ die contra Graecos navigavit. tam angusto¹⁴ mari proelium commisit¹⁵ ut eius multitudo¹⁶ navium se movere non posset. victus est magis etiam consilio Themistoclis⁶ quam armis Graeciae.

- (b) What answer did the ambassadors receive from the priestess of Apollo? [1]
- (c) (i) How did Themistocles' reaction to this answer differ from that of his fellow-citizens? [3]
(ii) Explain fully how you know that the Athenians were persuaded by Themistocles' advice. [3]
- (d) (i) Give full details of what Xerxes did when he arrived at Athens. [3]
(ii) Write down and translate the phrase which explains why Xerxes found it easy to do what he did. [1]
- (e) Describe fully the reaction of the sailors on the Greek fleet to what Xerxes had done. [3]
- (f) What did Themistocles do by night to persuade Xerxes to sail against the Greeks? [2]
- (g) Explain why the battle was disastrous for Xerxes. [2]
- (h) Give **four** English words, one for each, wholly or partly derived from the same roots as four of the following Latin words: *miserunt* (line 1), *tradiderunt* (line 6), *delevit* (line 9), *auderent* (line 10), *victus* (line 14) [4]
