It covers 1061469 square kilometres or 14% of Australia. The basin is made up of wetlands, flood plains and many croplands, including orchards, vineyards and grazing lands. The basin also contains a number of endangered species of birds and mammals, including some migratory bird sites of international importance. In October 2010, the Murray–Darling Basin Plan Guide was released for public comment. The Guide considers various options for the management of the basin.
