- 4. Analysis of continuity and maintenance of a core religious belief or beliefs within one or more religious traditions.
- 5. Analysis of the interplay between a tradition's religious beliefs and vision for society in relation to one or more specific issues.
- 6. Evaluation of the ways one or more religious tradition/s have responded to a significant challenge.
