

LOTE: Romanian GA 3: Examination

Oral component

GENERAL COMMENTS

Student performances in the 2006 oral examination ranged from good to outstanding. The topics used for the Detailed Study were 'Love and Nature in Mihai Eminescu's poems', 'Mihai Eminescu – famous Romanian poet' and 'History portrayed in Mihai Eminescu's poems'.

Students' pronunciation and level and appropriateness of vocabulary were very good. Most students were well prepared. Some students arrived with interesting visual displays, which added a further dimension to their Discussion.

SPECIFIC INFORMATION

Section 1 – Conversation

Overall, student performances were very good. Most students were very successful in dealing with the topic of the student's personal world. Strong students thought about what answers they could give and expressed their opinions well. They elaborated on their answers and tried to make them interesting and meaningful.

Some students did not give full answers or answered every question in very short one-sentence replies, which restricted their ability to deal with the content of the Conversation. Initiating topics and completing the Conversation without excessive support from the assessors is vital for achieving excellent results.

Section 2 – Discussion

All students spoke about Mihai Eminescu and his poems. Some mentioned a lot of poems but when asked could only talk about some. It is advisable to clearly state the topic and sub-topic and the texts prepared during the one-minute introduction. It is acceptable to say, for example, 'I know that Eminescu wrote other love poems such as..., but I have studied in detail for today...'

The level of language used in this task was very high. Most students were well prepared for the discussion of their chosen topics. More successful students memorised quotations from the poems and had plenty of opinions and ideas. Common mistakes were made in using the right verb and noun endings. When choosing poems or other texts, students need to remember that it could be a disadvantage to choose very short pieces about which they can say very little. Some students also chose very different poems, but could not say how they differed or what they had in common.

The Detailed Study should have been researched over 15 hours in class so the students are expected to know their topic well.

Written component

GENERAL COMMENTS

Students responded well to the written exam and to the variety of topics. Answers varied from good to excellent according to the difficulty of the texts and the level of language used. Some students struggled with spelling and the correct use of grammatical forms.

SPECIFIC INFORMATION

Section 1 – Listening and responding

Part A

General comprehension was good, but students must read and follow the instructions more carefully and convey the information more precisely.

Section 2 – Reading and responding

Part A

Students were required to read two texts and respond to them in English. Many students did not pay enough attention to the correct way of conveying information.

Part B

Question 8

There were many good responses to this question, and students generally scored well against the criterion of 'understand general aspects of a text'. The main points to cover in responses included:

- computers of the future will be more human
- they will have personality
- one can talk or write to them
- the washing machine will be activated by mobile phone
- you can give orders to your fridge
- cars will not pollute
- rockets will fly you
- universal robots and drugs.

Section 3 – Writing in Romanian

Students had a choice of four questions with all questions proving equally popular. Generally, students scored well against the criterion of 'relevance'; however, the 'depth of treatment' criterion could have been more successfully addressed.

Question 9

Students were asked to write a diary entry focusing on their personal experience of the events and the atmosphere of the Commonwealth Games in Melbourne. Some students who wrote on this topic failed to really express their personal experience, instead writing more generally about the games and what one could experience.

Question 10

Students had to write an imaginative story for primary students and build on the sentence, 'During a bushwalking trip I lost my balance and fell into a deep creek...' Students with strong writing skills wrote excellent stories; others struggled and forgot that the story was targeted at primary school children.

Question 11

Students had to write an evaluative report for their school magazine in which they compared and contrasted the Romanian and Australian school systems. This was quite a popular choice and students did quite well, being able to present differences and similarities of both school systems. Some students used anglicisms (such as the names of different subjects) as this was a topic they were probably more familiar with in English.

Ouestion 12

Students needed to write an article for a consumer magazine persuading Australian customers to buy a Romanian product. This was not a popular topic. The grammar used was generally excellent as was the breath and range of vocabulary used.
